

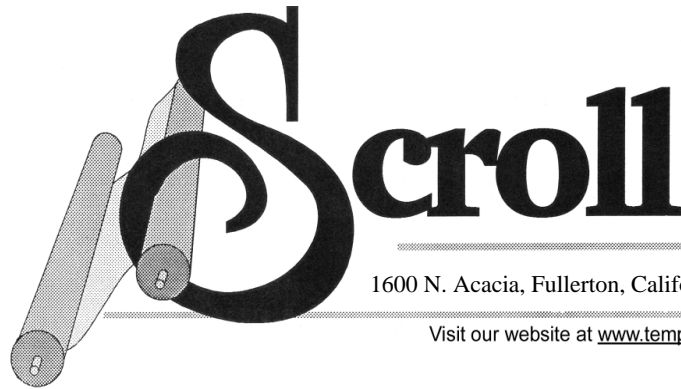

TBT's Spring Movie Festival ...



“TURN LEFT AT THE END OF THE WORLD” Saturday, April 17

Commencing just after the Six-Day War and amidst the turbulent climate of social change and post-colonialism in the '60s, "Turn Left at the End of the World" chronicles the relations between two communities -- Indian and Moroccan Jews -- in a remote Israeli desert town through the eyes of two girls coming of age. Nicole (Netta Garti) is a mouthy, flirty, but also naïve Moroccan teenager, and Sarah (Liraz Charhi) is thoughtful, intelligent, if quieter and more removed, whose family has just moved in next door.

There is no shortage of thought-provoking dialogue in the film, and as it is positioned at such a critical moment in history, there are many issues to be addressed and every one of them is handled with charm, humor and sophistication. The film is hilarious and devastating, bleak and beautiful: the narrative flows between emotional family sagas and comic community events effortlessly.

Message from Rabbi Milhander

Dear Friends,

I can see the advertising slogan already: “Yup, there’s a Japp for that!” No, I am not referring to a Jewish American Princess, and certainly not to any derogatory racial slur. I am referring to the very popular applications that are available to those who own a very popular type of cell phone. The “J” of course stands for Jewish. Thus, “Yup, there’s a Jewish application for that!”

And indeed there is. I just received an email advertising an application for the iPhone and iTouch that enables those who download it to learn and practice the Four Questions for Passover in Hebrew and transliteration. My, how far we Jews have come: from slaves in Egypt to a \$.99 downloadable application. Who would have imagined?

If you think about it, though, this is just the next frontier of technology that the Jewish people have always embraced. Though firmly rooted in tradition, history, ritual, and of course our sacred texts, we have always sought new ways to live and express our faith. For most of Jewish history, our religion was fluid, changing, and flexible. It is only in the last few hundred years that a segment of Jewish believers have attempted to freeze Judaism at a particular moment, to make it rigid and unchanging, unbending and not adaptable.

On one level a Jewish application for the iPhone may seem silly, and there may be some traditionalists who would seek to reject the latest technology. While I may spoof and make fun of the use of technology in sermons and bulletin articles, I do not deny its usefulness and the positive impact it can have on our lives and our Jewish lives. So, although I do not have an iPhone or an iTouch (in fact I’m not exactly sure what the difference is), I am delighted that “there’s a Japp for that!”

Speaking of the Four Questions, let me wish you all a very happy and healthy Passover holiday. I hope your seder meals are meaningful and enjoyable, infused with the beauty of our traditions, the warmth of family and friends, and of course, great food. The Talmud reminds us that we have to see ourselves as though we personally went forth out of Egypt. History is not something we read about in a book, it is something we recreate anew each year, it is something we live each and every day, it is something we personally experience and share with those around us.

The Seder meal is all about using your five senses, experiencing the Exodus story through sight, smell, taste, hearing, and feeling (or body position). It is about putting yourself, physically, emotionally, psychologically, spiritually, and every other “ally” into the story, into the experience, into the actual events. For this reason and many others, Passover is amongst our most endearing holidays with unlimited symbolism and significance.

So, why is this night different from all other nights? Because we step out of our selves and out of our comfort zones and we step into history. Because we take our experience as slaves in Egypt and our liberation from bondage and make it a paradigm for Tikkun Olam, the repairing of the world. Because at the same time that we step back and relive the events of the past, we look to future generations to carry on those sacred traditions. Chag samei’ach – have a very happy Pesach!

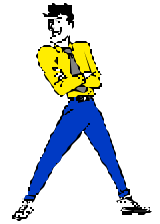

Religious School

April is the time of year when plans for the coming year really start to take shape. The basic calendar has been set so that I know how many sessions need to be budgeted for. I start conversations with staff members to determine how many new staff members might be needed for the future. While planning for the future, I also begin to evaluate the success of the current year so that I can alter curriculum and programs to better meet our goals.



The 2009-2010 school year has been remarkable in many ways. As you know, the logistics of where classes are meeting has been a challenge. The staff of both our Religious School as well as ECLC have been patient with the furniture that wasn't quite age-appropriate, lack of bulletin board space, excess noise, and other distractions that have no doubt impacted the student learning.

This year we implemented a new curriculum for Saturdays, the *Chai Curriculum* (created by the Union for Reform Judaism). The three strands provide our teachers and students with a rich approach to Torah, prayer, and *mitzvot*, and the lessons have been received well by all who have used them. Based on our experience with *Chai*, we will begin to look at the Hebrew curriculum written by the URJ to see whether it is appropriate for us here at TBT for the future.

The biggest change for our school this year was going from two weekday sessions to one for Hebrew classes. To compensate for the 90 minutes missing from the program, we added a half-hour on Wednesdays and a half-hour on Saturdays. However, the fact remains that students had only one exposure to the foreign language each week, and a two-hour session after a full day of secular school is exhausting. The education committee will be meeting to review the pros and cons of the new schedule to determine whether our future will see the return of Hebrew School on Mondays *and* Wednesdays, or whether we are able to meet our goals by continuing to meet on Wednesdays and Saturdays. Parent input would be greatly appreciated on the subject!

During the next couple of weeks we anticipate the presence of the cement foundation for our new school building. I have promised the children that as soon as the cement dries, they will be allowed to stand on the foundation and write their names with a message so that for the rest of their lives they will remember that they were part of the history of our new school building. What an exciting time for us to be part of the TBT family!

The remaining five weeks of the school year are filled with year-end activities. Please read on for upcoming dates to mark on your calendar. Our school may be small, but we are mighty ... and your presence is important to our children and to our Jewish community. Thank you, as always, for your continued support!

Here at E.C.L.C. we are in the Passover mode. So we just expected all the children to have heard and know the Passover story. We as a staff are always looking for new and fresh ways to teach the children all about The Exodus story. The staff spent the time planning as well as setting up our curriculum to be different and exciting! Since we have heard this story over and over and over again we really wanted a new spin on an old story.

So we decided to see what the children already knew. I started the singing of the Four Questions and no one was joining in. I looked at the other teachers and said "Maybe because it is in Hebrew the children are finding this difficult." So I began singing the ever popular song, "Oh Listen, Oh listen King Pharaoh." Once again the children (except for a few of the kindergartners) did not sing. We looked at each other and it slowly dawned on us that a lot of these children were new to the school and really did not know the songs, much less the story of Passover. Wow!!!! We were amazed. I realized how I had taken this Passover story for granted. I was on auto-pilot when it came to going through the rituals of this Passover holiday. I was brought up short. I realized I was not in the frame of mind nor heart to "Pass" on this story So I took a deep breath and started to tell the story orally just as the "telling" the Haggadah has been told many generations before.

I felt a little overwhelmed as this was the first time the majority of these children had the opportunity to hear this wondrous story of a man called Moses and a people called the Hebrews as they were led to freedom by a mighty G-d. The children were enraptured. It was so delightful to see the children become engaged with this story!

Like the great river Nile flowing through the land of Egypt, questions about this awesome story came flowing out of the children. They asked. "How did the water part?" "Why didn't the bush burn up?" "Why can't Pharaoh get along and do what is right?" The questions kept coming and coming for the next few weeks.

I was glad for the questions and just as glad to tell them that I do not have all the answers. I told the children, "It is good to seek out your answers. It is okay to not know everything, to realize there will always be quandaries in life and that this world as well as G-d is bigger than we can comprehend."

I thought to myself how incredible it is to have the privilege to tell the story once again. To know, that this wondrous story is fresh and exciting to an entire new generation. I hope this holiday has brought you a new and fresh feeling as well.

The City of Fullerton has compromised with us regarding the big hill of dirt at the top of the property. Originally they were expecting us to remove the dirt before they would give us our permits. It would have meant trucking it out and then back in order to back-fill the foundations. By covering the mound with the plastic, they are allowing us to leave it where it is until we need to use it.

It is very appropriate that the very first wall to go up is our *Holocaust Memorial Wall*. As soon as the Jerusalem stone arrives from China, Joe Bloomfield’s brother Dave will be starting to put the stone on the wall.

By the time you get to read this article we should have the rest of the foundation footings poured and then next will be the slab. We should be seeing the arrival of the steel by mid-April. At that time you will all truly be able to envision the size that our new Asa Learning Center will be.

By ensuring the future of our Congregation through adequate financial support, we are doing our utmost to protect our Jewish future and that of our children, as well as generations to come. TORAH STUDY: A Friendship of Learners

“*Havurah*”—Comes from the Hebrew word **haver**, meaning “friend.” A *havurah* offers friendship, an extended family, and a great way to really get to know one another.

Not too long ago, Temple Beth Tikvah sponsored a program featuring various *havurot*, or friendship communities to which new and seasoned TBT members were invited. I would like to mention yet another group which, for me, has become a very special community: The Temple Beth Tikvah Torah Study.

Ostensibly, the purpose of the group is for members to become thoroughly grounded in Torah, and to explore what these sacred texts mean to us today as Jews. However, studying Torah doesn’t begin to describe what happens from 9 to 10 o’clock on Saturday mornings. Armed with hot coffee and fresh bagels, we discuss and argue, sharing personal experiences and various points of view as we examine sacred biblical texts in detail. And we laugh...a lot.

We number among our group teachers, nurses, lawyers, horticulturalists, actors, oculists, housewives, house husbands...you name it, we got it! But there is one profession that we all have in common—that of learner. By the way, there is no such thing as a dumb question in Torah study. People are eager to respond to any queries, no matter what. All opinions are acknowledged, as long as they are presented in a respectful manner. And if you haven’t much to say and just want to listen, that’s okay, too. (Just listening is a great way to learn!)

The first Tot Shabbat, I am told, started with seven parents and their children and now a short time later it is tenfold.



For those of us who are still asking, "Do we really need a school for the future generation of Temple Beth Tikvah?" please join me at the next Tot Shabbat and you will see with your own eyes our future before us. We look forward to seeing you soon. She answered: "Yes, I was raised in this neighborhood, and my father was the rabbi, etc., etc., etc." She told this young woman about how wonderful Temple Beth Tikvah is and seeing that she was expecting, Eliana told her about the ECLC (Early Childhood Learning Center). The end of the story is that at this last Tot Shabbat I saw the "baby" and her older brother, who both are now at the ECLC and the family are members of Temple Beth Tikvah. So thank you to our daughter, Eliana, for welcoming another family into our Temple family.

The second miracle is that a few years ago we met a lovely woman at the home of our daughter's mother-in-law. Arlene Taslitz used to be a member of TBT and a past president of

This woman found out that we were from the Temple in Fullerton and she was interested in finding out more about the ECLC because her daughter and her husband were living in La Habra and were interested in finding a preschool for their daughter. We told "Grandma" about our ECLC, and this last Tot Shabbat she very proudly introduced us to her daughter and grandchildren and thanked us for the contact. Her daughter has the granddaughter at the ECLC and she recently had a second baby who I am sure will follow in her sister's footsteps by going to the ECLC. The grandmother was so thrilled that everything had worked out and that her daughter and family were so happy with the ECLC and felt that we were somehow responsible. We did not deserve the praise. We just tell people what we have, and the rest is history.

We would like to ask you to tell your friends and neighbors about our Temple and schools, and the rest will be history.

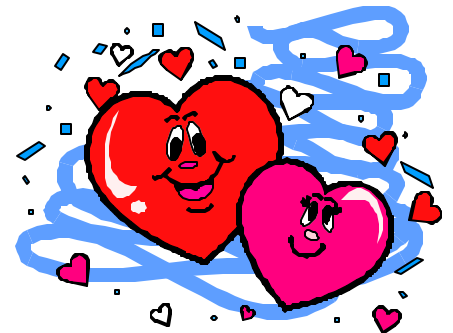
