Message from Rabbi Milhander

Dear Friends,

The recent arrest of a prominent African-American Harvard professor by a white police officer, and the intervening comments by President Obama which sparked a firestorm of controversy in the media, has once again raised some age old questions: Who is a racist? What is a racist? Can a minority be a racist? Like the African-American community, the Jewish community has had to wrestle and struggle with these questions over the years and over the centuries.

We know that one must be very cautious and hesitant to label someone anti-Semitic. Today, there are varying degrees of hatred, bias, and bigotry. Thank God, we live in a time and place devoid of institutional prejudice, but as we all know, just as morality cannot be legislated, neither can attitudes and feelings.

Throwing out such terms and labels often shuts the door to dialogue and communication. Pinning the scarlet letter of "racist" or "anti-Semite" may make us feel better and may seem to right some wrong or injustice, but in truth, it serves no positive or productive purpose. Without question, the actions of some individuals and groups are clearly anti-Israel, anti-Jewish, and have connections to historical anti-Semitic accusations against Jews and the Jewish people. When someone or some group espouses such ideas, let alone if action is taken upon them, then they should be called out promptly and prominently. But just throwing out labels willy-nilly again serves no purpose.

For me, the more interesting question is whether or not a member of minority group can be racist or anti-the dominant culture. This accusation is often made by those in the majority against the minority to mask bias and to convolute the discussion. It is an old and well-known media tactic to accuse your nemesis of whatever negative position you hold or whatever negative action you have taken or propose to take.

Historically, Jews and the Jewish people were accused of being anti-Christian. Various verses in the Torah and various statements in the liturgy and the Talmud were single out as proof that the minority Jews held bias and prejudice against the majority culture and religion. Indeed, if we were to be honest with ourselves, we would admit that there are statements in the Jewish tradition that would seem to be anti-Christian, but this should not surprise us. For much of Jewish history, we were persecuted, expelled, forced to convert, and outright murdered for our beliefs and rituals. It is not surprising to find a few statements that condemn those who were persecuting us.

Of course, today in the United States in particular we are well integrated and fully accepted by the majority population. Our contribution to the fabric of American life cannot be over-estimated. We have wonderful relations with our Christian neighbors and although there is a smattering of anti-Semitism here and there, life today for the Jewish people is better than ever before in our history.

Those few anti-Christian statements that can be found in Jewish texts have been dismissed, discounted, and rejected long ago. The few lines that once appeared in the prayer book have been minimized or removed all together. And yet, there are still those that accuse the Jewish people and Judaism as projecting bias and prejudice. Are individuals capable of such feelings and actions? Sure. But Judaism as a whole today cannot be accused of having negative feelings towards the majority.

Everyone seems to want the episode with the Harvard professor and the Cambridge police officer to be a "teachable moment." So what is the lesson? Perhaps it is that every individual, whether part of a minority or the majority, must be held responsible for their own words and actions. Just because someone is Black or Jewish or Hispanic or Asian, or a woman or Catholic or Muslim or homosexual, or a southerner or from Chicago or likes classical music, or whatever, that doesn't mean that they represent the entire group. I believe our minds are programmed and wired to make connections, so it is normal and natural to assume that the one represents the many. But we have to be very careful not to allow our stereotypes to overwhelm our sense of reason. Each of us must use words cautiously and be careful not to project upon any group the actions of any one individual.

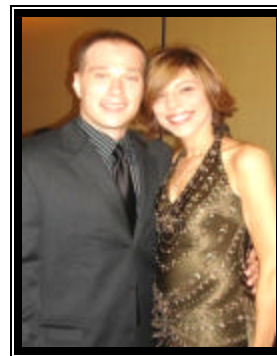
WEDDING ANNOUNCEMENTS

Recently I learned that the current economy was taking its toll on yet another Jewish institution..*Morasha*, one of Orange County’s two Jewish day schools, was closing its doors. The school is 23 years old, and while its enrollment was projected to be close to 100 students this fall, it just could not sustain itself.

It occurred to me that in closing, they would have furniture and fixtures that they might need to liquidate. I called the director of the school, a long-time colleague of mine, and asked her about the possibilities. She was thrilled that we might be interested, but even more thrilled that the furniture might be of use to another Jewish school. What started as *Morasha’s* lemon could become TBT’s lemonade.

At the beginning of July Lila Pesner, Rachael LaCross, Eric Van Raalte and I went to the day school with our list of needed items for our new school building. We walked through the school making bids on items we wanted, and even found a few things that we had not thought of but found enticing! Within a few days we were notified that our bids were accepted and we could come to pick everything up.

For a fraction of the cost of brand new furniture, we were able to purchase desks, chairs, book cases, cabinets, and other items that will give us a good head start on what we will need to complete the classroom furnishings for *The Asa Center for Lifelong Jewish Learning*.

Many thanks go to Rabbi Milhander (truck driver/shlepper), and to other shleppers Max Litt, Greg Spalter, Bryan Redhead (and friend Trevor), and our custodians Guillermo and Norberto, for being available to help pick up all the furniture while I was out of town on vacation. Thanks to Joe Bloomfield for making the storage arrangements so that the furniture could be brought to TBT and saved until the building is completed.

By the way, on a recent morning walk with my dogs, I realized something very interesting (maybe even *bashert* – meant to be). Do you know what the Hebrew word “*morasha*” means? Literally translated, it means “LEGACY!”

We were delighted that so many of you came to share our wonderful groundbreaking celebration for the **Asa School for Life Long Jewish Learning** on the 28th of June. Thank you again to all who worked so hard to make it such a special day for TBT. We expect the construction to get started as soon as all of the permits are in.

The Legacy Committee met on the 13th of July and discussed the following Sub-Committee designations. If there is someone out there that would like to come on board, please call Lila or Henry and we'll be happy to add you to our list.

GROUNDBREAKING FOR THE ASA LEARNING CENTER

JUNE 28, 2009

SPEECH BY RABBI HAIM ASA



Next week's Torah Portion describes the last act of the drama of our people's 40 years journey and stay in the desert. It was exactly 40 years ago in 1969 when I brought a half a dozen of you---and thank G-d some of you are still here with us today---to view this beautiful property on the top of Acacia. At the time, we had been at a facility in Brea for four and a half years, and before that we had met at the Fullerton YMCA. It was now time for us to begin our journey to our permanent home in Fullerton, the Promised Land.

It took our biblical ancestors 40 years in the desert to reach their promised land---it has taken us 40 years to offer our children the school they s o deserve.

Over the years we have educated over 1500 children in our portable trailer, which has now been donated to a school in Mexico so other children can continue to be educated. Our children have an excellent reputation in the Orange County Jewish Community. They continue to show the excellent of the education that they have received here at Temple Beth Tikvah. If we were able to create such children, despite of our limited physical facilities, imagine what we can do with our new school. It is our hope and prayer that the new school will not only double and triple our school population but also perpetuate the excellent quality that we have become known for.

40 years ago some of you hesitated to make a decision to move to Fullerton; therefore, some of us put our own houses as collateral for a bank loan to help make our dream become a reality. AND WE DID IT!!!

30 years ago we decided that we needed a sanctuary separate from the social hall, and again we took out loans to make that dream become a reality AND WE DID IT!

Today we are breaking the ground for our learning center. Elaine and I are grateful to all of you for contributing, participating, planning, and carrying through with this project so that once again a dream is becoming a reality and WE ARE DOING IT!

A year and half ago 450 of you came to honor Elaine and me at the launching of this project. We would like to thank all of you who, despite of the economically difficult times, have been more than generous in making this dream become a reality.

Our 40 years in the desert are over, and now we face new challenges as this project moves toward completion. May we continue to educate our children with Jewish values and love of Torah; may we be worthy of G-d's blessings as we build for the next generation of Jewish life in Northern Orange County, and may our presence in this community always be a blessing to all.

Before I ask you all to join in the "Shehecheyanu" prayer thanking G-d for allowing us to have reached this day, for having sustained us in good health, and for allowing us to celebrate together, I want to thank G-d for the presence of our children and grandchildren who have come from near and far. We love you very much, and now let us join in the "Shehecheyanu" prayer.

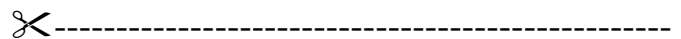

Marty Baker-Jordan, TBT member and former Professor of Piano and Piano Pedagogy (the art of teaching) at CSUF for 32 years is volunteering to assist parents of pre-college children or adult learners (18 and up) in securing qualified music instructors. Marty has personally trained many area piano instructors through her pedagogy degree programs at CSUF but she is also knowledgeable about many other qualified instructors in Orange County. Parents often do not know where or how to look for the best private music instructor for their children. Marty is very familiar with the skills, personalities and availability of qualified music instructors; she is most willing to talk to any congregants by phone to assist in finding the very best music instructor for their children. Since piano is her primary instrument, she feels she can be most helpful in recommending piano instructors but if parents are looking for teachers of other instruments, she can make some recommendations and, if she feels she cannot provide adequate information, she will direct parents/adult learners to someone who can. If requested, she will also provide information to parents/adult learners to assist them in such important things as

- how to interview the prospective teacher (YES, interviews should go both ways...teachers interview students and parents/adult learners interview teachers!)
- what is the best and most appropriate age for music study of pre-college students to begin
- advice about group study for the very young child
- what are the goals for music study (this will help match the right teacher to the right student)
- why does the learner wish to study a musical instrument
- is there a particular style of music the learner wishes to study (Marty is classically oriented but can also recommend jazz and pop teachers...BUT she will make a strong case for securing a classically based course of study first).
- are there geographical considerations
- any other questions about private music instruction

Marty will not be able to provide music instruction costs of any recommended teachers. Also, be assured Marty receives no "kick-back," commissions, etc., from any teachers she may recommend. In fact, area teachers do not even know she is offering this service to TBT members.

She can be contacted by phone only. E-mail communications would not be appropriate and will not be used except for sending names, addresses, phone numbers of recommended teachers, if desired, following phone conversation(s). This is to ensure accuracy of teacher information.

Marty can be contacted by phone at 714-524-2744 until 11p.m. on weekdays. If she is traveling, she will retrieve home phone messages so leaving messages is highly recommended. She will do her best to return your call within two days.

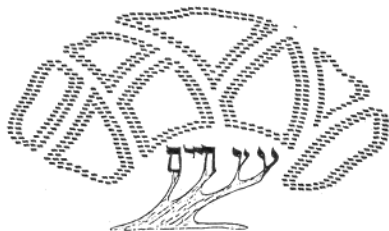
